Fr Joseph writes:

As Catholics, we believe in the bodily resurrection of Our Lord from the dead. He ate food (Lk 24:42-43) and was touched by His disciples (Jn 20:27). He was no ghost. Yet as St Paul tells us, He is only the firstborn from the dead (Col 1:18). Others will follow including us, God willing. But what will our risen bodies be like?

When Christ rose from the dead there was clearly something extraordinary about His resurrected body. After all, some of the disciples who knew Him very well failed to recognise Him when they first saw Him, for example, Mary Magdalene who supposed Him to be the gardener (Jn 20:15), and the two disciples walking to Emmaus (Lk 24:16). And elsewhere, 'He appeared in another shape to two of them walking' (Mk 16:12). This failure to recognise Him may have something to do with their expectations and the nature of their faith: they did not expect to see Him; they did not, as yet, believe in His resurrection.

But even more than this, although Christ's body was the same one in which He had lived and died (remember, He showed St Thomas the wounds made by the Roman soldiers) still that same body, nonetheless, was now glorified and bore some remarkable traits. Catholic theology tells us that our resurrected bodies will bear the same characteristics. So what are they?

First, *impassibility*. That is, our bodies will be rendered incapable of suffering or pain: 'God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes, and death shall be no more, nor mourning, nor crying, nor sorrow shall be anymore, for the former things are passed away' (Apoc 21:4). We know that pain, disease, sickness, and death entered the world as a result of sin. In heaven, where there is no sin, there will be no more suffering.

Second, *brightness*. That is, our bodies will be rendered glorious. But the degree of our brightness will differ according to our merits. Christ's glory at the Transfiguration dazzled Peter, James, and John (Mt 17:2 *et par*), With us, one will bear 'the glory of the sun, another the glory of the moon, and another the glory of the stars. For star differs from star in glory' (1 Cor 15:41).

Third, *agility*. That is, our bodies will no longer be weighed down as they are on earth by gravity, and they will be enabled to pass, as quick as thought, from one part of creation to another (being 'sown in weakness, it shall rise in power,' 1 Cor 15:43), which is how Our Lord sometimes appeared after the resurrection without the disciples quite knowing how He had appeared among them, for example in their midst (Lk 24:36; Mk 16:14).

Finally, *subtility* or subtlety. That is, our bodies will share the spiritual existence of the soul, being rendered capable of passing through material substances as was Our Lord's body when He appeared to the disciples in the middle of a locked room (Jn 20:19, 26). For each of our bodies 'is sown a natural body, [but] shall rise a spiritual body' (1 Cor 15:44). As St Paul adds elsewhere, Our Lord 'will reform the body of our lowness, that it may be made like to the body of His glory' (Phil 3:21).

Interestingly, the reverse of these four qualities are said to be the lot of those in hell.

Our bodies are consecrated by the Holy Oil of Chrism at our Baptism, and again at our Confirmation, (and a priest's body at his ordination). These consecrations, and the knowledge that our bodies will rise again, should help form our attitude to how we treat our bodies, both in terms of physical well-being and, more importantly, in terms of spiritual well-being.

Resurrexit, sicut dixit. Alleluia! He is risen, as He said. Alleluia!
