Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XV

After we have sung the *Gloria*, we come to the *Collect* or *Opening Prayer* of the Mass. On Good Friday, once the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ has been read or sung, there follows the General Intercessions of the Church. In each case (there are ten of them) the celebrant bids the people pray, and introduces, with a concise formula, the general meaning and intention of the prayer that is to follow. After a silent pause (during which everyone kneels), this introductory formula and the silent prayers of priest and people are summed up in a prayer which collects everyone's intentions together and presents them to Almighty God, hence the word *Collect*.

Over the years, this order of praying became abbreviated whenever it was used at the opening of Mass so that, now, the priest bids people to pray (*Oremus* or 'Let us pray'), pauses briefly without any introductory formula, and then proceeds straight to the *Collect* which sums up the general meaning and intentions of the Mass which follows.

As we know, the Mass is chiefly something Christ offers up to His Father. As a result, most *Collects* or *Opening Prayers*, just like most prayers throughout the Mass, are addressed to God the Father. This, in turn, means that when the priest, acting *in persona Christi* ('in the person of Christ'), says the *Collect*, it is Christ Himself who is making this prayer to the Father on our behalf. But, and this is an important 'but,' because we have been invited to pray, and because of the silent pause during which our prayers are collected together, our prayers are added to those of Christ and He presents *our* intentions to the Father along with His own. What is more, He filters out, as it were, any selfish or vested interests we may have included in our prayers so that what gets presented to the Father is a purified form of our prayers with all the self-centred bits taken out. In other words, the version of our prayers which the Son offers to the Father is a version which is already conformed to the will of God.

This, of course, is the meaning of phrases in the Gospel such as, 'Whatsoever you shall ask the Father in my name, that will I do' (Jn 14:13) and 'Ask, and it shall be given you' (Mt 7:7). These phrases do not mean that *whatever* we ask for will be given to us, but whatever we ask for *in Christ's name*, that is, through Christ who filters and purifies our prayers until they are conformed to the will of the Father, will be given to us. There is a big difference between these two!

The theology of the *Collect*, then, sums up the theology of the Mass in some respects. For example, all of the prayers that are offered up '*through* Our Lord Jesus Christ [the] Son' remind us that Our Lord acts as the go-between, the mediator, between the Creator on the one hand and His race of fallen creatures on the other. Christ is the bridge, the high priest, the pontifex, who spans the gap between God and Man, a gap that should never have existed in the first place but which opened up as a result of sin. God the Son is the means by which God the Father reaches down to His fallen creatures and draws them back up to Him once more. God-the-Son-Incarnate comes down to earth, suffers, dies, descends into Hell, rises from the dead, and ascends back into Heaven, scooping us up along the way, as it were, and taking us up to Heaven with Him. In this great sweeping action Christ redeems sinners, heals their alienation from their God, and restores them to an even higher state than Adam enjoyed at the beginning insofar as we who have been baptized have become adopted as sons and daughters of the Father, brothers and sisters of God the Son, and co-heirs with the Son to all the blessings and graces of the Heavenly places (Eph 1:3).

So, as you can see, there is more to the *Opening Prayer* of the Mass than just a 'pause for thought.' In the *Collect*, we enter, liturgically, into the work of salvation itself!
