Station days grew out of the early Christian practice of visiting the tombs of the martyrs and celebrating the Eucharist at those sites. By the fourth century, the practice of carrying out an itinerary to various churches of the city began to develop during the days of Lent. In those days it became a tradition for the pope to visit a church in each part of the city and celebrate Mass with the congregation. In the early centuries, the Lenten fast lasted all day, and so towards the evening the Christians of Rome would begin to gather at a church known as the *collecta* ("gathering place"), where they would be joined by the assembled clergy of the city and the pope. The procession would then move through the streets to the station church, not far away. Having gathered at the daily *statio* ("standing place"), the pope would then celebrate a solemn Mass, and fragments of the Host were sent to the other *stationes* of the city in order to symbolize the unity of the city around its bishop. After the conclusion of Vespers, the day's fast was broken with a communal meal.

Fr Joseph writes:

CONFESSION pt IV: Continuing our thoughts on the Sacrament of Confession, we now come to what we (priests go to Confession too!) must do in order to make a worthy Confession.

First, we must undertake an *Examination of Conscience*, that is, we must consider carefully what sins we have committed since our last Confession. Typically, we might use the Ten Commandments as a basis for this, and there are plenty of leaflets and prayer books that list appropriate questions to ask ourselves.

Second, we must be *contrite*. In other words, we must be genuinely sorry for offending God by our sins, and we must make a firm purpose of amendment, that is, we must *intend* (at the moment of our Sacramental Confession) not to commit these sins again (even if we think we are, in fact, too weak to avoid them). We must also promise to avoid the occasion of sin, that is, any circumstance which might lead us to sin.

Third, we must *confess* our sins. We must name all mortal sins of which we are aware, and the number of times we have committed them, and we are strongly encouraged — for the sake of deeper devotion — to name our venial sins also.

Fourth, we must *make satisfaction* for our sins, that is, we must do the penance set us by the priest, devoutly and sincerely.

In addition, we ought not to make excuses for ourselves during Confession nor list the circumstances in which we sinned, but simply to state our sins, leaving the priest to ask for details if necessary. Then we will make an Act of Contrition, and the priest will grant us absolution, the moment when we are freed of our sins.

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Lætare Sunday So called because of the opening words of the Introit for today's Mass in Latin, *Lætare Ierusalem: et conventum facite omnes qui diligitis eam*, 'Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and be glad for her, all you that love her,' Lætare Sunday is more or less halfway through Lent. With the words of rejoicing, the solemnity of the season is lifted slightly, and purple vestments are lightened to a rose colour. Flowers and additional music are allowed today too. We begin to look forward with an ever lighter heart towards the glory of Easter.

Rose Sunday was also the day when Popes blessed the Golden Rose, traditionally conferred as a token of affection on churches and shrines, on sovereigns and heads of state. The custom may date back, it is thought, to pre-Charlemagne times, and recent recipients have included the Marian shrines of Guadalupe (2013), Częstochowa (2016), Fatima and Aparecida (2017), and Csíksomlyó (2019).

Today is also Mothering Sunday when, historically, those who were preparing for Baptism at the Easter Vigil would gather together at the Mother Church of the diocese, the Cathedral, for their final stage of preparation. In Victorian times, live-in servants were allowed time off to visit their families, especially their mothers.
