#### Fr Joseph writes:

#### The Catholic Church & Tradition - pt II

In pt I we saw that Tradition with a capital 'T' is one of the two sources of Divine revelation alongside Scripture. Both contain and make known the inerrant Word of God. We saw also that Tradition preceded Scripture insofar as it was the handing on of what had been revealed by God that fed into the Church's declaration of which books should be included in the Bible and which should not. In this sense, the Catholic Church is not based on Scripture: rather, Scripture grew out of Tradition. We saw that Tradition—with a capital 'T'— is the handing on by the Church of all that has been Divinely revealed to Her.

Tradition makes itself known in a number of ways. For example, in 1950, when Pope Pius XII officially and infallibly promulgated the dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, body and soul, into heaven, he did not simply wake up one morning and think, 'What shall I promulgate today?' The Pope had consulted all the bishops of the Church, and had asked them to consult among their people, asking them to what extent belief in the Assumption was already universal and whether now was the time to make such a proclamation. In fact, there had long been a Church-wide belief in the Assumption of Our Lady, and a feast under this title had been included in many liturgical calendars down the ages. After much prayer and consideration, it was concluded that not only had there been universal belief in the doctrine throughout the Church's history-attested to by numerous writings along the way-but that just after a war which had seen appalling death camps, and widespread death and destruction, with human bodies as well as human souls being, quite literally, thrown onto rubbish heaps and burnt in vast numbers, was exactly the right time to proclaim a dogma which, amongst other things, upheld the sanctity of human life, body and soul, as something ordained by God. The Pope's Apostolic Constitution in which the dogma was promulgated, Munificentissimus Deus, is well worth reading seventy years later. (Do not be put off by the Latin title! Go to: *vatican.va*)

Even a pope, then, can act only in line with the already established universal Faith of the Catholic Church and in accordance with what has been Divinely revealed and handed down consistently by Tradition. Just as the one thing that God cannot do is to contradict His own nature (for example, by taking back a gift He has once given, or by making Himself less than all-knowing or all-powerful) so, too, His Church cannot contradict Her own nature by suddenly declaring something to be doctrinally true which had never been believed before, or by going off at a doctrinal tangent, or by reversing what had been universally held and believed up until that point.

Another way in which Tradition can be seen in the Church is, funnily enough, in the dress and speech of the pope. Popes, once they have been elected, choose a new name (Joseph Ratzinger became Pope Benedict), dress exclusively in white, and—at least until the very recent past—use the first person plural pronoun, 'We...' Each of these customs symbolizes the ways in which a mere man allows himself to be absorbed into the office of pope, as it were, and allows the office of pope to shape him rather the man trying to shape the office.

When a pope says, 'We' he is—it is true—making use of the medieval practice of the 'royal we' whereby he exerts his authority, but this practice also assumed a theological meaning along the way. The 'We' refers to himself and all his predecessors back to St Peter. In other words, no pope can act or speak especially in matters of dogma and doctrine—except as part of a long continuum that goes back to the very first Vicar of Christ. Dogmatically and doctrinally, no pope has the authority to contradict what previous popes have pronounced and taught. Whilst a new pope's teaching may develop organically what has been proclaimed before (as we saw last week), he cannot hand on to others what he himself has not received from Tradition.

Tradidi quod et accepi, that is, 'I handed on what I received.'
