TUESDAY 1^{ST} & WEDNESDAY 2^{ND} November

ALL SAINTS (HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION) & COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

The schedule for both days is:

Masses: 8am (TLM), 12:15pm, 7pm (sung). Confessions will be heard before each Mass. The rosary will be said after the 12:15pm Mass.

Indulgences

A *plenary* indulgence, applicable to the Holy Souls in Purgatory, is granted to the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a church or oratory on All Souls Day (Nov 2^{nd}) and recite the Creed and Our Father.

A *plenary* indulgence, applicable to the Holy Souls in Purgatory, can be gained on each of the days from 1st to 8th November by visiting a cemetery and praying there for the faithful departed. On other days of the year a *partial* indulgence can be gained.

A *partial* indulgence, applicable to the Holy Souls in Purgatory, can be gained each time the prayer, "*Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen*" is recited.

A *partial* indulgence is granted to the Christian faithful, applicable to themselves or to the Holy Souls, who devoutly recite the *De Profundis*.

A *partial* indulgence is granted the Christian faithful, applicable to themselves or to the Holy Souls, who devoutly recite Lauds or Vespers from the Office for the Dead.

To gain an indulgence you must say the prayer or perform the work:

whilst being free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin

and, within several days either side of this,

go to Confession

receive Holy Communion

pray for the Pope's intentions.

Fr Joseph writes: To Judge The Living And The Dead

We know neither the day nor the hour (Mt 25:13) of Christ's second coming, but what we do know is that on that day, all will be judged according to their deeds on earth, and the goats will be separated from the sheep (Mt 25:31-46).

In fact each of us will undergo two judgments. The first, the Particular Judgment, will take place at the moment of our death when we shall first come face to face with our God. Each of us will be deemed fit to enter Heaven or to be cast out to hell. Only those who are perfect may enter the perfection of Heaven, so those who are judged fit to enter Heaven but are not yet perfect will undergo the perfecting process of Purgatory, a purging that will cleanse from our souls any and all temporal (as opposed to eternal) punishment that remains outstanding as part of our atonement for our sins. Only Christ can atone for our sins, yet each of us must play our part and, as St Paul says, 'complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions' (Col 1:24). In other words, our salvation requires our active involvement. If we die without having done sufficient penance to have contributed fully our part in the process of our own salvation, then that process is completed and perfected in Purgatory, a place of both suffering and of joy and hope. Those who attain to Purgatory know that they are bound for Heaven. Yet, because our life here on earth is the time given to us to grow to be more like to Christ, death is the cut-off point, as it were, and souls in Purgatory can no longer contribute through acts of the will to their own perfecting. As a result, they are wholly dependent upon the prayers of the saints in Heaven as well as those of us who remain here on earth. Consequently, it is a duty of all Catholics to pray for the souls of the faithful departed, that is, the Holy Souls in Purgatory.

At the end of time, at the moment of Christ's coming in glory, those who have already died, as well as those still alive on the earth, will be caught up in the final, the General Judgment, which serves four purposes. First, the judgment of God upon the wicked who have thrived in this life will be seen by all, and that judgment will be vindicated (Ps 50[49]:6). Second, our bodies will then be resurrected to share in the virtue and glory, or the guilt and condemnation, of the soul. Third, the trail of good that each of us leaves behind us in this life will be rewarded, and the trail of harm that we have left behind us will be judged and the concomitant mess will be sifted and sorted out by God, and any guilt punished. And, finally, Christ, so ignominiously and ignobly dishonoured, condemned, and crucified, will be vindicated and glorified before all of creation.

Out of the depths I have cried to Thee, O Lord, Lord hear my voice. *O let Thine ear be attentive to the voice on my supplication.*

If Thou, O Lord, should observe iniquity, Lord who shall endure? But with Thee there is merciful forgiveness, and by reason of Thy law I have waited for Thee, O Lord.

My soul has relied upon His word, my soul has hoped in the Lord. From the morning watch even until night let Israel hope in the Lord.
