#### DAY OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

All must **FAST** who have reached the age of 18, until their 60<sup>th</sup> birthday. (Others, especially children, are encouraged to fast.) To fast means eating less than you would normally, and in any case no more than one meal and two small snacks. The sick, the frail, expectant and nursing mothers are exempt from fasting. ABSTINENCE means avoiding eating meat and fowl, and foodstuffs made from them, as a reminder of the Word-Made-Flesh who died for us. The laws of abstinence apply to all who have reached their 14th birthday.

Fr Joseph writes: In part twelve of our series on the Creed we consider the beauty of the Incarnation.

#### HE CAME DOWN FROM HEAVEN

'For while gentle silence enveloped all things, and night in its swift course was now half gone, thy all-powerful word leaped from heaven, from the royal throne' (Wis 18:14-15). These words from the Book of Wisdom capture the beauty of the mystery of the Incarnation. As is often the case, both the words of Scripture and the words of the liturgy of the Church are multi-layered in their meaning. Here, the night refers both to the hour in which Our Lady gave birth in a stable in Bethlehem as well as to the dark night of sin in which mankind has been wrapped ever since the Fall. The leaping figure puts us in mind of 'my beloved [who] comes leaping upon the mountains, bounding over the hills' (Song 2:8), of the lame man who leaps as a hart when beauty bursts forth at the coming of God (Is chap. 35), and, of course, of the blind Bartimaeus leaping up when Our Lord calls him (Mk 10:50).

The description of the Garden of Eden in the Book of Genesis allows us to see the harmony between heaven and earth that existed from the beginning, the concord that was always intended by God from the outset. When sin ruptured that harmony between Creator and creature a fissure opened up between heaven and earth, a chasm so great that finite man could not stretch across it and touch his infinite Creator. Only One who is Himself infinite, who is both man and God, can bridge that divide, leaping down from heaven to lift a fallen race back to where its God would have it be once more. The untold joy at the chance of reconciliation, the beauty to be found in the moment when heaven reaches down to touch the earth, is expressed again and again in the readings, prayers, and hymns of Christmastide. For, having spoken to mankind through the prophets 'in many and various ways' (Heb 1:1), God now speaks directly through His own Son to His beloved but wandering people. The Son of God becomes the mediator (Heb 9:15, 12:24) between God and Man, between Creator and creature, between a perfect God and a fallen race, the gobetween who will act as a bridge-builder, a pontifex. Indeed He will become the bridge itself, to span the gap that never should have been. For this 'I am come into this world' (Jn 9:39, 12:46, 18:37).

Adam sinned in Eden, and we sin also, through pride: we think we do not need God in order to find our way through life towards eternal happiness. However, the Word of God

behaves differently. He leaps down from His royal throne at someone else's behest: 'I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of Him who sent me' (Jn 6:38). If we are to journey back to God across the bridge that He has built for us, then we must act with similar humility.
