Fr Joseph Writes: We take a break from exploring the Nicene Creed and look instead as the responsorial psalms used on Sundays in Year A during Lent. This week,

Psalm 50 – The Miserere

Ps 50 is the fourth and best known of the Seven Penitential Psalms. (The others are Pss 6, 31, 37, 101, 129, and 142). Known as *The Miserere*, it has often been set to music, most famously by Gregorio Allegri (1582-1652).

In 2 Kings 11 we read the story of King David's adultery with Bathsheba, the wife of Uriah. Afterwards, David plots to kill Uriah by having him placed in the very front line of the battle. When official mourning for Uriah is ended, King David takes Bathsheba to be his wife. 'And this thing which David had done was displeasing to the Lord' (2 Kings 11:27). Nathan, the prophet, upbraids the King and warns him of God's great displeasure which is all the more severe because of the special favours and blessings God has bestowed on the King. Thereupon David repents of his sins and, as part of his repentance, writes this psalm (ch. 12).

The whole psalm (of which we only hear a portion in today's Responsorial Psalm) is, in many ways, a perfect prayer of repentance and firm purpose of amendment. It opens with David pleading for mercy, and begging that the stain of his sin be removed: 'Have mercy on me God in your kindness. In your compassion blot out my offence.' The psalm is as much a lament for a lost friendship with God as it is a hymn of penitence. 'O wash me more and more from my guilt, and cleanse me from my sin,' cries David. The King is aware of the treachery of his sin, and sees it as God must surely see it, namely as an act of outrage against God's holiness, a violation of His sacred laws, and a rebellion against His will. David becomes haunted by his sin and writhes in anguish, knowing as he does how it has blackened his soul and pitted him against his God: 'Against you, you alone, have I sinned; what is evil in your sight I have done.'

At the beginning of Mass today the choir sang *The Asperges*, which in fact is a line taken from this very psalm (although not included in today's Responsorial Psalm): Asperges me, Domine, hyssopo et mundabor, lavabis me, et super nivem dealbabor. 'Thou shalt sprinkle me with hyssop, and I shall be cleansed. Thou shalt wash me, and I shall be made whiter than snow.' So deep is King David's desire to have his friendship with God restored that he wills his soul to be washed not just white but 'whiter than snow.' Yet David knows that he cannot wash his own soul clean. Only God can forgive sins: only God can restore purity of heart. So, the King pleads once more with God, begging Him not just to cleanse his heart, but to renew and purify it, and strengthen it against future sinfulness and temptation: 'A pure heart create for me, O God, put a steadfast spirit within me.'

Finally, in today's excerpt, afraid that he may have lost God's friendship for ever (because Nathan has told him that 'the sword shall never depart from thy house,' and that the Lord will, 'raise up evil against thee out of thy own house,' 2 Kings 12:10-11), King David implores God not to punish him according to what he truly deserves: 'Do not cast me away from your presence, nor deprive me of your holy spirit.'

Much of the remainder of the psalm is given over to David's resolutions of satisfaction and amendment as he promises to teach the unjust the ways of God so that the wicked may be converted; as he pledges to sing of God's justice; and as he declares that if God were only to open his lips, then he, David, shall learn to sing God's praises for evermore.
