Fr Joseph Writes: We take a break from exploring the Nicene Creed and look instead as the Responsorial Psalms used on Sundays in Year A during Lent. This week,

Psalm 94 — Venite, exultemus Domino

For at least 1,600 years—since the time of St Porphyrius of Gaza who died in AD 420—this psalm has called God's people to prayer first thing in the morning. Known as the Invitatory Psalm (from the Latin, *invitare*, 'to invite'), it is used as the first psalm of the Divine Office each day. 'Come let us praise the Lord with joy: let us joyfully sing to God our Saviour,' sings out the first verse. It summons sleepy heads to wake up, and to begin their day in the best possible way, namely with a hymn of praise to God on their lips.

There are eleven verses in the psalm altogether, but in to-day's Responsorial Psalm we use only vv.1-2 and 6-9. The complete psalm is divided clearly into two parts. The first part (vv.1-7) is the call to prayer, inviting us to sing the praises of God, to 'come before Him giving thanks,' and 'with songs [to] hail the Lord.' As the Latin title suggests, there is something exultant about the tone of this psalm, and is chosen by the Church, in part at least, in order to set the tone for our prayers for the rest of the day. Whatever may follow—even great afflictions—if our hearts begin the day singing God's praises then we are more likely to see His goodness in all things throughout the waking hours to come, and are less likely to sin against His goodness.

The verses that are omitted (vv.3-5) sing of the greatness of God, proclaiming Him to be the 'great king above all gods,' and that 'in His hands are the depths of the earth, and the tops of the mountains.' In other words, He and He alone is the Creator of the wonders of nature that we see all around us. The psalm goes on: 'His is the sea, for He has made it, and the dry land which His hands have formed.' What power! What magnificence to be able to make the seas and to shape the dry land! He is like no other God. All the more reason, then, why we must 'Come in... bow and bend low... and kneel before the God who made us,' (v.6) as the second verse of today's Responsorial Psalm proclaims.

At this point, the tone of the psalm alters slightly as it moves from acclaiming God's greatness to recognizing Him as the Shepherd whose gentleness provides His flock with pasture and whose hand leads His people. God provides nourishment as well as leadership and protection.

Why, then, do we continue to harden our hearts against Him? In the second part of the psalm (vv.8-11) the mood is altogether different. Of these four verses, we have only the first two (vv.8-9) in today's Responsorial Psalm but they make it clear that all is not well. These two verses are a direct reference to the events in today's First Reading from the Book of Exodus where God's people grumble against God's chosen one, Moses. They lament, as was their wont, that they would have been better off if they had stayed as slaves in Egypt where at least they had plenty of water to drink. They have lost trust in Moses and faith in God. They put Moses to the test and, sadly, in his exasperation with the people he has been leading, he fails the test, striking the rock twice instead of trusting that God will keep His promise and bring forth water with just one blow of his staff (Numbers 20:8-13). As a result, Moses is denied entry into the Promised Land into which Joshua leads God's people instead (Dt 34:4-5,9).

The warning is for us all. Even praising God at the start of the day will not, of itself, guarantee our fidelity to God throughout the day. We must be ever on the watch.
