


Did you know... there is a special blessing for Easter eggs?



Fr Joseph writes: We resume our look at the Nicene Creed which we interrupted for Lent. In part fourteen of our fortypart series we consider the Incarnation itself.

AND BECAME MAN

'What He was, He remained and what He was not, He assumed,' writes Pope St Leo the Great (c.400 -461). The Word of God remained divine even as He assumed human nature and became Man. As we have seen already, the Son of God Incarnate is both fully God and fully Man, not half and half; nor, at one end of the God-Man spectrum, God with just a veneer of humanity, nor, at the other end of the spectrum, Man with a few supernatural powers. Instead, He is wholly God and wholly Man. He has two natures (divine and human) and two wills (in His divine nature and in

His human nature). Yet neither is He suffering from some form of Dissociative Personality Disorder. Rather, He is one person, wholly integrated, and in full possession both of His divine attributes and His human faculties.

It is by being one person yet with two natures and two wills (divine and human) that the Word-made-Flesh can bridge the gap between God the Creator on the one hand and a fallen human race on the other.

In the person of the Son of God Incarnate we have a God who reaches down to a race that has distanced itself from its Creator and which cannot, of its own accord, reach back up to its God. And at the same time, in that same Son of God Incarnate, we have human nature being offered up to the Father to be forgiven, purged, purified, reconciled to its Creator, and transformed.

In the person of the Son of God Incarnate, heaven and earth touch; God reaches down to Man to redeem and rescue him, and lift him up to a participation in the divine life forfeited by Adam's original sin and by our actual sins.

'And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us' (Jn

We celebrate the Word becoming flesh with great festivity at Christmas, but in fact the Word became incarnate at the moment that Our Lady uttered her 'let it be,' her fiat: 'Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be it to me according to your word' (Lk 1:38), which is why the feast of the Annunciation, or Lady Day, is celebrated with such solemnity nine months earlier on 25th March.

God had never abandoned His creatures even after they sinned in the Garden of Eden, but with the Incarnation He comes to our aid in a unique manner: He becomes one of us and shares our sufferings, our anguish and even our death so that we might participate in His resurrection, His divine life, and His eternal happiness and blessedness in heaven. The Son of God Incarnate is Emmanuel, a name which means Godwith-us (Is 7:14 and Mt 1:23).

Out of the depths of our sinfulness and its consequences we have cried to the Lord (Ps 130[129]). Now, in the Incarnation, He answers our cry, and leaps down to become one with us, to redeem us, and to restore us to where God would have us be.
