Fr Joseph writes:

Hæc dies quam fecit dominus exsultemus et lætemur in ea

'This is the day which the Lord hath made: let us be glad and rejoice therein.'

Ps 117:24

There is one advantage in the world's hijacking of Christmas insofar as it has, for the most part, at least left the celebration of Easter to those of us who believe. By and large, we are not swamped by secular festivities with noisy gongs and clanging cymbals (1 Cor 13:1). Secular Easter songs do not blast out from radio stations and television screens. Typically, there are no hollow baubles, there is no sparkling tinsel, nor is there sound and fury signifying nothing.

Yet this is not to say that we shouldn't celebrate Easter with an effervescence of triumph. The resurrection of the Incarnate Son of God from the dead is the greatest triumph of any battle in the history of the human race, and those who think the Church—the continuation in time of the personal presence of Christ—should not be triumphal in Her manner are mistaken. There can be no greater glory on earth than the defeat of sin and death by the One who is, Himself, holiness and life. There can be no mightier conquest than the vanquishing of Satan; no more outstanding a victory than the overthrow of the prince of darkness by He who is the Light of the World.

Twenty years ago, on Easter Sunday morning in 2003, I stood with thousands of others in St Peter's Square in Rome for the Pope's Mass. At the end of Mass the choir took up the hymn, the *Laudes Regiæ* with its opening words and refrain, *Christus vincit! Christus regnat! Christus imperat!*" (Christ conquers! Christ reigns! Christ commands!) The sky was a cloudless blue, Christ's Vicar himself had blessed all those present and was just about to bless the city and the world in his *Urbi et Orbi* address, and the crowd was exultant. Truly, one knew that Christ really was risen from the dead and that, whatever else may be happening in the world, Christ was reigning from on high, and goodness, beauty, and truth would triumph in all things. It was an exhilarating moment.

And so it should be for us today, for this is the day that the Lord has made, and it is right and proper that we should rejoice, be glad, and sing our hearts out in exultation!

Ipsi soli imperium, laus et iubilatio, per infinita sæcula sæculorum. Amen To Him alone be authority, praise and rejoicing, through endless ages of ages. Amen.
