

Fr Joseph writes: We continue to look at the third Person of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, the Holy Spirit.

THE GIVER OF LIFE

As we have seen, whenever God acts upon the created order, all three Persons of the Blessed Trinity act in unity. That is, all three Persons – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – created the world, all three redeemed us, and all three sanctify us. Collectively, as we know, these *operations* are referred to as the *Divine Economy*, or the Economy of Salvation, that is, the work of God, or the work of salvation. (By contrast, the internal workings, or life, of the Trinity are sometimes called the Essential Economy because they deal with the essence of God.) So whilst we often refer to the Father as the Creator, the Son as the Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit as the Sanctifier, properly speaking all three Persons perform all three works.

Even so, it is both helpful to our devotion as well as to our understanding, and not wrong, to consider the works of the three Persons of the Trinity in these three distinct ways, not least because some of the *operations* of God can be distinguished one from another, for example, only the Son of God *in His humanity* died on the Cross, accomplishing an aspect of our redemption which was not accomplished by the Father or the Holy Spirit.

What, then, do we mean by the Holy Spirit as the Sanctifier?

When God created Adam, He 'breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living being' (Gen 2:7). As we have seen, the Hebrew word, rûah or ruach, means both spirit and breath. Not only did God give human life to Adam, He also gave Adam a share in His, God's, own life. God breathed into Adam a breath of divine life. This presence of God's life in Adam's soul is what we call sanctifying grace. When someone has sanctifying grace in his soul when someone is in what we call a state of grace – he has God dwelling within him. Because we usually think of the Holy Spirit as the One who sanctifies us (makes us sharers in God's holiness), St Paul says that those who have been baptized are 'temples of the Holy Spirit,' (1 Cor 6:19). In other words, our bodies, when we are in a state of grace, house the Holy Spirit (or, more properly speaking, all three Persons of the Blessed Trinity), and we are made holy.

Having forfeited the gift of sanctifying grace through Original Sin, a gift he had been given to hold in trust for the whole human race, Adam forfeited it on behalf of us all, and each of us is born without this precious gift. It is restored to us individually through the Sacrament of Baptism. When we are conceived we are given natural, biological life by our parents. When we are baptized ('born again,' Jn 3:3) we are given the supernatural life of *sanctifying grace*, and our soul, which up to this point has existed without life, becomes animated by divine life, the breath of the Holy Spirit, the Giver of Life.
