Fr Joseph writes: In part 37 of our forty-part series on the Creed (last week's was 36: apologies for the mistake) we consider the need for Baptism.

I CONFESS ONE BAPTISM FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS

'As in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive' (1 Cor 15:22). Adam forfeited participation in the divine life (a gift entrusted to him on behalf of us all) through his original sin of pride and disobedience. As a result, we are all born without the gift of *sanctifying grace*. Yet this grace is restored to us through the Sacrament of Baptism, the sacramental participation in Christ's dying to self and rising to a spiritual and supernatural new life.

Our Lord instituted the Sacrament of Baptism through His own baptism in the waters of the River Jordan when, in His humanity, He was anointed as, and revealed to be, the Messiah; when He taught that 'unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God' (Jn 3:5); and when He commanded His Apostles to baptize all nations, 'in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit' (Mt 28:19). Moreover, it was through His death on



the Cross, and from His pierced heart, that the life-giving waters of baptism first flowed forth to cleanse a world sullied with sin (Jn 19:34).

It is only through this sacramental participation in the death and resurrection of Christ that we can be restored once more to a share in the divine life which was always intended by God to be ours in the first place. Christ is the pontifex, the bridge, between the perfect and all-holy God on the one hand, and a fallen and sinful humanity on the other. Having alienated itself from its Creator, finite and damaged humanity cannot now reach up and reclaim for itself a participation in the supernatural life of an infinite God. Only One who is both God and Man can bridge that gap. So it is that Our Lord says, 'No one comes to the Father, but by me' (Jn 14:6). This is at the heart of Christianity, namely that it is only through Christ that we may be saved.

There is only one baptism: anyone baptized, is baptized into the One True Fold, as St John Henry Newman called it.* And, what is more, there is only one formula for valid baptism, namely using the words given to us by Our Lord in the Gospel (see above). So, any modern re-working of this wording would be invalid, for example, 'I baptize you in the name of the Creator, and of the Redeemer, and of the Sanctifier.' Furthermore, only water would be valid matter because it symbolizes the water in which we wash. Just as we do not wash in milk (unless you are Cleopatra) or lemonade, or coffee, so we cannot baptize with any of these liquids. The outward sign of a sacrament must match the reality of what is happening interiorly to the soul; in the case of baptism, cleansing.

Finally, the Sacrament of Baptism, like the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Orders, cannot be repeated.

^{*} The two important discussions — of how those who are not members of the Catholic Church may be saved, and what is the state of those baptized but then brought up as non-Catholics — are too lengthy and involved to be explored here.
