This week, we look at the opening of Matthew's Gospel, symbolized by the winged man, and consider the humanity of Christ. Hymns, readings, and meditations, concluding with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Please join us.

ROSARY CRUSADE

On Friday, the feast of the Immaculate Conception, we launched our Rosary Crusade, praying for the conversion of souls in Ipswich and beyond. Many of us have family members and friends who have lapsed or who have never known Christ, so we include them. We pray also for the people of our town and our coun-



ty, people who walk past our church every day but never give Our Lord a second thought, as well as all those who are searching for Christ but do not even know that it is He for whom they are searching. We gather such people up in our intentions and add them to our spiritual bouquet of rosaries that we shall lay at the feet of Our Lady of Ipswich on 15th May next year, the feast of Our Lady of Ipswich and of Our Lady of Grace.

Fr Joseph writes: Most of us are probably familiar with a whole range of popular Christmas songs with lines like, 'It's the most wonderful time of the year,' and 'Chestnuts roasting on an open fire,' and 'Have yourself a merry little Christmas,' and most famously of all, 'I'm dreaming of a white Christmas.' We love them, and they help to make our Christmases exactly what we want them to be. But even as we start to hum these tunes, we can almost see old Uncle Screwtape from C.S. Lewis' book, The Screwtape Letters, rubbing his hands with glee. He has succeeded in a most astonishing accomplishment, namely the sentimentalizing of one of the most hard-nosed and concrete realities in the whole history of the world, namely the Incarnation of the Son of God. At the Incarnation, the second Person of the Blessed Trinity emptied Himself of all the appearances and appurtenances of divine glory and took to Himself instead our human nature so that He could die brutally on a Cross a few years later, for us men and for our salvation, as we say every week in the Creed.

Peculiarly, we human beings seem to enjoy anticipation more than attainment in almost every aspiration we set ourselves. The smell of fish and chips seems to excite us more than the taste; the thought of a pint of beer or a glass of wine sets us smacking our lips more than the actual flavour; the longing for a new acquisition bends our steps towards it more than the sense of satisfaction fulfills us once we have our new and prized possession; and even falling in love can leave us feeling giddy in a way that attaining that love never does! It is as if we have a hole deep within us that we long to fill, and yet whatever we think will fill it never quite does. A little bit like a burger and fries from a fast-food outlet!

And so it is with Christmas. The anticipation during Advent—indeed, beginning weeks or even months ahead—is all! October, and especially November and the first three weeks or so of December, fill us with a looking-forward-to that we rarely experience at any other time of year. But for how many people is Christmas Day, with its presents and its food and its drink, just another of life's anticlimaxes? How many on Boxing Day will say, 'Well, that's that for another year,' and begin to pack everything away again?

Mr Screwtape, and his Father Below, as he calls Satan, win triumph after triumph each succeeding year as they reduce Christmas, a little bit at a time, to an ever more shallow spree of superficial sentimentality.

It's all great fun, and what else would the world expect from a priest except that he pour cold water over such festivities? But maybe, just maybe, the beauty of Mass on Christmas morning, or even the hushed stillness of a church later on Christmas day when, going for a breath of fresh air, we pop into the church to kneel down before the crib and whisper a prayer, can bring us closer to what we *truly* desire.
