**Fr Joseph writes:** We continue our new series on the Sacraments by looking at the idea of an incarnational religion.

# THE SACRAMENTS PT 2 AN INCARNATIONAL RELIGION

God's will to co-operate with His creatures, and have them co-operate with Him, involves His making use of His creatures in order to bring to fulfilment His work of creation and governance, of redemption and salvation. In other words, collaboration between Creator and creatures was an integral part of God's plan from the outset, and from the beginning God has worked with, in, and through His creatures to accomplish the divine intent. The created order is not somehow outside of the divine presence or separated from God. Rather, in some sense, the created order is held within God's presence and is sustained by God being present to it, as it were, and it being present to God. The created order is not an extension or emanation of God, it is not an integral part of God, but it is ordered and governed by Him, and nothing can happen without His willing it to happen, either actively or through His permissive will.

This active involvement of God in His created order, His making use of His creatures to bring about His will – almost as if He were dependent upon them to accomplish certain ends – is what makes Christianity an incarnational religion. Insofar as God has willed things to be this way, we can say that He has willed to surrender something of His divine power into the hands of His creatures, not absolutely of course, because He can choose to take back such authority or power. Nevertheless, in this divine plan we can see a foreshadowing of the Son of God's emptying Himself, and taking to Himself the form of a servant, and coming to be made in the likeness of His human creatures (Phil 2:5-8). The Incarnate Son of God takes to Himself the material fabric of His own creatures and becomes subject to human beings, for example His parents (Lk 2:51), in order to accomplish something on behalf of those creatures.

But God's working with, in, and through His creatures is multiform. He makes use of many creatures, and in many and varied ways. He uses the sun to give us light, warmth, and to enable living things to grow. He uses water to give life and to cleanse. In the work of redemption, He makes use of nails and wood, of Roman soldiers, of gall and vinegar, of blood and water.

Similarly, in the supernatural work of re-creation God makes use of creatures to bring about good in the order of grace, to give life and to restore life, to forgive, to ransom and to heal, to sanctify and to raise up. Chiefly, God makes use of human nature, uncorrupted by sin, in the Incarnation of His Son. But in bringing His saving grace to His people down the ages, and across the face of the globe, that is, in order for His people to participate in the mysteries of their own redemption and sanctification, He also makes use of water and oil, of bread and wine, of gestures and words. God uses His creatures to redeem His creatures, and to bring them to a participation in the divine life.
