CANDLEMAS

THE PURIFICATION OF OUR LADY & THE PRESENTATION OF OUR LORD

Forty days after the nativity of Our Lord, that is, 2nd February, Our Lady and St Joseph take the infant Christ to the Temple in Jerusalem to do what the Law of Moses requires (Lk 2:22-40).

First, Our Lady is purified after having given birth. Just as a chalice is purified at the end of Mass after it has contained the Precious Blood of our Saviour (that is, it is returned to a fit state to be stored once more in the sacristy until the next Mass) so a woman, having performed something so precious as bringing new life into the world, is purified and brought back, as it were, to a more ordinary and mundane state of life..

Second, the first born son must be given to Almighty God as a gift and then bought back, or redeemed, by the parents with the offering of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.

Third, Our Lady and St Joseph are met by Simeon who has been inspired by the Holy Spirit to enter the Temple that day. He greets Mary, but warns her that just as her Son will become a sign of contradiction in the world so she, too, will suffer a sword to pierce her own soul, a prophecy which is fulfilled when she stands at the foot of the Cross and watches her Son die for the sins of the world.

Simeon, in his song the *Nunc Dimittis*, which is said throughout the Church every evening by everyone who says Compline (Night Prayer), declares the new infant to be a 'light of revelation to the people' It is from this prophecy that we get our ceremony of candles. At Candlemas, candles are blessed, and we walk in procession imitating the Holy Family's journey to the Temple. Just as Mary and Joseph carry Our Lord, so the candles we carry represent the light of God's sanctifying grace that we carry in our souls.

Candlemas brings to a close the Church's season of light which began on Christmas Day when the Light of the world was born in a stable in Bethlehem. After this day, Christmas cribs are taken down once more and stored until next Christmas.

THE FEAST OF ST BLAISE & THE BLESSING OF THROATS

On 3rd February we celebrate the feast of St Blaise, and throats are blessed. There will be the traditional Blessing of Throats after the 10am Mass on Saturday of this week.

Fr Joseph writes: We continue our new series on the Sacraments by looking at the important doctrine of free will.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 3 — FREE WILL

For many, the question of free will, especially when it is used for evil ends, is problematic. Some hold to a largely deterministic view of life and suggest that our actions are so shaped by our environment and upbringing that we have little, if any, free will. Others question how a good and all-powerful God can permit His creatures a freedom that enables and allows them to cause harm. As with so many aspects of our Faith, the paradoxical answer rests not in an 'all-or-nothing' approach, but in a 'both-and' view. We both have free will and our behaviour is influenced by circumstances; God is both allpowerful and He is limited by an inability to contradict His own nature.

'God is love' St John teaches us (1 Jn 4:8). God is the One who, by His very nature, loves, and cannot not love. Elsewhere, St John shows us what Our Lord meant by 'love' when, at the Last Supper, He said, 'Greater love than this no man has, that a man lay down his life for his friends' (Jn 15:13). In other words, the essence of love is to give, and in the case of Our Lord, He willed to give everything He was and had: 'I lay down my life... No man takes it away from me, but I lay it down of myself' (Jn 10:17-18).

To love, then, means to give.

When God chose to create us, He did so that we might share in what He is and has. For God to give a creature existence and life is to have given that creature a share in His own existence and life. In other words, the act of creation is itself an act of giving and therefore an act of love. If to love means to give, then love can be given and received, but it cannot be taken. The single most fundamental element of God's work of creation, and of God's plan for His rational creatures, is that He would love them and that they would be free to choose to love Him in return. But for us to love Him, we must be free to choose to love Him: He cannot take our love.

To have been created without this free will to choose to love, or to give, would have meant that we had not been created in God's image and likeness (Gen 1:26). But God could not create rational creatures except with the free will to choose to love. To have done so would have meant contradicting His own nature because He is pure reason, pure freedom, and pure love. And if there is one thing God cannot, in fact, do it is to contradict His own nature. He cannot, for example, make Himself less than infinite, less than all-powerful, less than allknowing, less free, less than love itself, for then He would cease to be God.

This freedom to love, to choose to give, lay at the heart of what the sacraments are and how they work.
