LÆTARE SUNDAY So called because of the opening words of the Introit for today's Mass in Latin, *Lætare Ierúsalem: et conventum fácite omnes qui dilígitis eam*, 'Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and be glad for her, all you that love her,' Lætare Sunday is more or less halfway through Lent. With the words of rejoicing, the solemnity of the season is lifted slightly, and purple vestments are lightened to a rose colour. Flowers and additional music are allowed today too. We look forward with an ever lighter heart to the glory of Easter.

Rose Sunday was also the day when Popes blessed the Golden Rose, traditionally conferred as a token of affection on churches and shrines, on sovereigns and heads of state. The custom may date back, it is thought, to pre-Charlemagne times, and recent recipients have included the Marian shrines of Guadalupe (2013), Częstochowa (2016), Fatima and Aparecida (2017), and Csíksomlyó (2019). Today is also Mothering Sunday when, historically, those who were preparing for Baptism at the Easter Vigil would gather together at the Mother Church of the diocese, the Cathedral, for their final stage of preparation. In Victorian times, live-in servants were allowed time off to visit their families, especially their mothers.

Fr Joseph writes: We now turn to the Sacraments themselves.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 9— BAPTISM: NECESSARY FOR SALVATION

Baptism is the first of the seven Sacraments. No other Sacrament can be validly received unless someone has been baptized. Baptism is also the most important of the seven Sacraments being necessary, as it is, for salvation. No one can attain heaven without being baptized: 'Unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God' (Jn 3:5). Baptism brings about several effects, but chiefly it is the means by which our alienation from God as a result of sin is remedied, and by which we are initiated, inserted, into the supernatural life of God to become 'partakers of the divine nature' (2 Pet 1:4). Heaven is the full fruition, the fulfilment, the perfection of this partaking which is why it is not possible to attain to the glory of heaven without being baptized. The Catholic Church baptizes infants because of this need.

The main mission of the Church, of the Apostles and their successors – is to 'Go... and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit' (Mt 28:19). No task holds a greater priority; no undertaking is more urgent.

There are three kinds of baptism. Baptism of *water*, instituted by Christ, is the Sacrament of Baptism properly so called. As water is poured over the person being baptized, or he is fully immersed in water, both the stain of original sin and the stains of all actual sins are washed from the soul of the individual.

Baptism of *blood* is so called because by the shedding of blood for the sake of Christ – that is, in martyrdom – an individual's soul may be purified of the stain of sin. Baptism of *desire* is the wish, implicit or explicit, to receive Baptism of water. When accompanied by perfect charity (that is, the love of God rather than the fear of hell), Baptism of desire also purifies the soul from the stain of sin. Baptism of blood and Baptism of desire are not, properly speaking, sacraments but they supply the place of the Sacrament in someone who cannot otherwise receive Baptism of water.

What of those who are good people but do not believe in God or the Gospel? God is not limited by His own Sacraments but can operate outside the sacramental system that He Himself instituted, yet we are not in a position to presume that He does so. The Sacraments are the only sure means of receiving sanctifying grace, and are the ordinary means by which God infuses grace into the soul. Whilst an individual may live a good life according to *natural* virtues, carrying out many good deeds in the service of his neighbor, nevertheless eternal life involves a participation in the *super*natural life of God which can only be attained through sanctifying grace, that is, the indwelling of God in the soul. Unless we are already participating in the life of God on earth, we cannot be sure of being in that necessary state of union with God when we pass from this world to the next.
