#### FIVE SERMONS ON THE HOLY EUCHARIST

This week we continue to explore the nature of sacrifice.

# THE SACRAMENTS PT 28: THE MASS – THE NATURE OF CHRIST'S SACRIFICE

To love means to give. Where Adam, through pride and disobedience, tried to take what belongs properly only to God, Christ, the Second Adam (1 Cor 15:45), emptied Himself of all that was properly owed to Him as God, and, being obedient to the Father's will, humbled Himself and became as we are, yet without sin, even to the point of accepting death on a Cross (Phil 2:6-8). The cynic asks, Why did the Father send His Son and not come Himself (Gal 4:4)? In a very real sense, the Father could not come down to earth precisely because it required a go-between to act as a mediator between the Creator and His creatures, so that the gap between God and People, caused by sin, could be bridged, and Man could be lifted up once more to a share in the divine nature. It needed someone who is both God and Man to bridge the gap between Man and God.

It was, then, in obedience to His Father's will (Jn 6:38) that the Son came down to earth, sent by the Father and not acting on His own whim (Jn 20:21). Despite being sent, still Our Lord chose to lay down His life, it was not taken from Him (Jn 10:17-18). This is the essence of love, namely, to give. The Son of God gave His life, and spared Himself nothing. No one can have greater love than to give his life for others (Jn 15:13). This act of giving is the essence of Christ's sacrifice and is the means by which we are redeemed.



The resurrection is no mere afterthought for if Christ had not risen from the dead our faith would be in vain (1 Cor 15:14). It is from the living Christ, resurrected, and raised up to His place at the right hand of the Father (Rom 8:34), that we draw all life, all graces, and all blessings. Had Christ not been raised we would all still be dead in our sins (1 Cor 15:17). It is true that Christ's death and resurrection cannot be separated from each other, but there is a distinction between what was effected by His death and what was accomplished by His resurrection. In His resurrection and ascension back into heaven, Christ raises us up with Him to a share in divine glory. Yet it was not the act of being restored to glory that redeemed us, but the act of extravagant self-giving. We are redeemed because the Son of God gave His life as a ransom for many (Mt 20:28), buying back from the Father, as it were, the gifts Adam had forfeited at the Fall but which the Father had always willed that we should have from the beginning. Christ's perfect offering is the fulfilment of Abel's gift, and the remedy for Cain's failure.

This is why the Crucifix with a figure of Christ on it, and not a bare Cross, is the icon of our Catholic Faith. It is on the Cross that we see Christ as both the *Priest* who offers and the *Victim* who is offered.

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
