'Hard cases make bad laws.' The heartstrings of us all are tugged when we see elderly people suffering. Surely, we ask, God cannot want this? And of course the answer is, 'No, He does not.' But helping people to commit suicide, or even outright euthanasia, is not the answer, for God 'created all things that they might be' (Wis 3:14).

Human beings suffer because we, collectively as a race and individually, have turned our back on God through sin, and now suffer the consequences of having alienated ourselves from the source of life and goodness. The suffering and death of Christ on the Cross has not abolished suffering, of course, but it has given meaning to suffering. Accepting our pain as if it were a gift from God, turning it around and offering it back to Him as a penance for sin, is how we unite our sufferings to those of Christ's sufferings on the Cross. In this way, we can imitate Christ in His dying so that our dying may bear the same fruit, namely everlasting life.

It is true that not everyone thinks like this or believes in Christ, but we, as Catholics, must do our bit to try to bring God's kingdom about here on earth by preserving human life from the destructive forces of our modern society. After all, do we not pray, 'Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done'? The world does not understand because, as God says, 'my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor your ways my ways' (Is 55:8). All the more reason, then, to bear witness to the goodness, the truth, and the beauty of life that comes from our Creator.

Fr Joseph writes:

This week we continue our look at Penance and the Sacrament of Confession.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 33: PENANCE – CONTRITION

The *matter* of the Sacrament of Penance is unique among the Sacraments because it involves words only, and not water as in Baptism or Bread and Wine as in the Holy Eucharist. The matter of the Sacrament of Penance consists of the threefold acts of the penitent, namely *contrition*, *confession*, and *satisfaction*.

By *contrition* is meant sorrow for our sins, a firm purpose never to sin again, and a detestation of the sins committed. There are two kinds of contrition, *Perfect* Contrition and *Imperfect* Contrition.

Perfect Contrition is sorrow for sin arising from perfect charity, that is, from love of God alone without any admixture of other motives. Perfect contrition is sorrow for offending God simply because He is God; for offending a perfect God who is infinitely good, holy, merciful, lovable, and true, without regard to whatever He may have done for us.

Such contrition, when joined to a desire and a resolution to receive the Sacrament of Penance, is sufficient to remit our sins at once, even before we have been to Confession. However, if our sins are mortal, we are strictly bound to confess them in our next confession, and certainly before we receive Holy Communion again. Why so? Because the Sacrament of Penance is not only about being reconciled with the love of God but about being at one with the whole body of the Baptized, that is, with all the members of the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church, and therefore we must have confessed those sins to a representative of the Church in the form of a priest.

Imperfect Contrition, or Attrition, is sorrow that arises from an inferior motive than the love of God alone, for example, from a consideration of all that God has given to us, or His goodness towards us, from the fear of hell and the loss of heaven, or even from a proper appreciation of the heinousness of sin itself. Attrition alone is not sufficient to restore us to God's favor. Rather, there must be repentance for past sins and a resolution to begin a new manner of life. When these features – attrition, repentance, and a firm purpose of amendment – are combined in the Sacrament of Penance, then a beginning of a love of God is supposed, and our sins are absolved and we are restored to God's favor.

Contrition must be: *interior*, that is, it must spring from the heart, the seat of the will, and not merely from the lips; *supernatural*, that is, it must arise from the workings of God's grace and not merely from natural motives such as fear or regret of earth-bound consequences of our sins, such as shame before men, or loss of health, property, or reputation; *universal*, which means we must be sorry at the very least for *all* our mortal sins. We cannot be sacramentally absolved of one mortal sin whilst failing to confess or repent of another; and *sovereign*, that is, we should be prepared to sacrifice everything rather than offend God mortally.
