A MATTER OF OBLIGATION

The question arose recently, should we feel obliged to go to Mass on Sundays and Holy Days? or is it just a matter of *choosing* to go?

Piety (or godliness or holiness) is one of the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit (Is 11:2) by which a person is moved to delight in God and the things of God. This, alone, might move someone to want to go to Mass.

Justice is the virtue (one of the four cardinal virtues) by which we give to others what is their due. Religion is a subset of justice: it is the virtue by which we give to God what we owe to God.

All creatures are duty-bound to give God homage and adoration. Sensate, insensate, and inanimate creatures do this by being and doing what they were created to be and do. Rational creatures (angels and humans) do this through acts of the will. Having been created by God, we are obliged to observe the Commandments He has given us simply because He is the Creator. The third Commandment, 'Keep holy the sabbath day,' is only fulfilled, the Catholic Church teaches, by going to Mass and abstaining from servile labour under pain of sin. So, yes, we are obliged to go to Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

By the grace of God, perhaps we can also delight in doing our duty, as the saints did, at the same time as fulfilling our obligations.

On this Education Sunday we give thanks to almighty God for the work undertaken by all our Catholic Schools, Colleges and Universities across England and Wales.
