SOUL CAKES

Blessing of Soul Cakes following the 12:15pm Mass on Thursday, 31st October.

Bake & bring your own Soul Cakes to be blessed ahead of All Saints & Holy Souls.

Our modern day Hallowe'en custom of trick-or-treating is a corruption of a mediæval tradition of praying for the dead. Children would go round all the homes in the village, promise to pray for the souls of those who had died in that household, and were rewarded with a Soul Cake.

Here at St Pancras we shall bless Soul Cakes on All Hallows Eve as part of a re-sanctifying of what has become a very pagan celebration. There are several recipes for Soul Cakes online. Here's just one. Get baking!

300g plain flour 2 tsp ground mixed spice

A pinch of nutmeg 150g butter, diced 150g caster sugar 75g currants 2 tbsp milk 1 tbsp oats

½ tbsp cider vinegar

2 egg yolks (or 1 whole egg, beaten)

- (i) Preheat the oven to 180C, fan 160C, gas 4. Sift the flour, spices and a pinch of salt into a mixing bowl, then add the butter and rub in with your fingers. Stir in the oats, currants and sugar.
- (ii) Whisk the egg, milk and cider vinegar together until just combined, then stir into the dry ingredients. Bring together into a soft dough, and add more milk if the dough is too dry.
- (iii) On a floured surface, roll out to about 5mm thick. Stamp out the soul cakes with a 6cm to 7cm round cutter, and score a cross lightly on the top. Transfer to two greased baking trays.
- (iv) Bake for 15-25 minutes until pale golden brown. Cool on a wire rack. Makes 30.

'Hard cases make bad laws.' The heartstrings of us all are tugged when we see elderly people suffering. Surely, we ask, God cannot want this? And of course the answer is, 'No, He does not.' But helping people to commit suicide is not the answer, for God 'created all things that they might be' (Wis 3:14).

Human beings suffer because we, collectively as a race and individually, have turned our back on God through sin, and now suffer the consequences of having alienated ourselves from the source of life and goodness. The suffering and death of Christ on the Cross has not abolished suffering, of course, but it has given meaning to suffering. Accepting our pain as if it were a gift from God, turning it around and offering it back to Him as a penance for sin, is how we unite our sufferings to those of Christ's sufferings on the Cross. In this way, we can imitate Christ in His dying so that our dying may bear the same fruit, namely everlasting life.

It is true that not everyone thinks like this or believes in Christ, but we, as Catholics, must do our bit to try to bring God's kingdom about here on earth by preserving human life from the destructive forces of our modern society. After all, do we not pray, 'Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done'? The world does not understand because, as God says, 'my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor your ways my ways' (Is 55:8). All the more reason, then, to bear witness to the goodness, truth, and beauty of life that comes from our Creator.

Fr Joseph writes: This week we continue our look at the Sacrament of Confession.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 35: PENANCE – SATISFACTION

The topic of satisfaction can be easily misunderstood, in part because it forms another of the many paradoxes in our Faith: only Christ can make satisfaction for our sins, and yet we, also, must play our part in rendering satisfaction for our sins. It is not *either* Christ *or* we who make satisfaction, but *both* Christ *and* we who do so. As St Paul says, 'In my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions' (Col 1:24). But we must be careful here. Only Christ's afflictions can make satisfaction to the Undivided Trinity for the sins of the human race. Our penances can contribute to the process of rendering satisfaction only if we unite them to the sufferings of Christ to the point of participating in Christ's own sufferings, as it were, and by carrying the Cross *with* Him, as Simon of Cyrene did (Mk 15:21 et par).

How do we carry the Cross with Our Lord? By offering to Him, in prayer, our own sufferings as gifts of love instead of rejecting the opportunity to do so by complaining about them. We are not obliged to go in search of additional opportunities for suffering and penance, at least not until we have perfected our acceptance of those that come to us in the ordinary circumstances of our daily lives. (In other words, it is perfectly reasonable to take medicine to relieve a headache. God gives us medicines as gifts of His healing power. But when something is beyond our control, then our prayer might usefully be, 'Help me by your grace, O Lord, to accept this tribulation as a participation in your sufferings for the sake of my salvation and that of all the world.' That is, we can ask God to help bring about a change in our hearts so that we can accept with serenity the things in life that we cannot change. To accomplish this would be no small thing.) But we are obliged as Catholics to accept those penances demanded of us by the Church because She stands in the place of Christ and acts with His authority, as Our Lord Himself said to St Peter, 'Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven' (Mt 16:19). The penances imposed by the Church include Friday abstinence, appointed days of fasting, and, in the context of the Sacrament of Confession, the penance given by the priest as part of the Sacrament.

The penance given in the Sacrament is likely to be a prayer or set of prayers with which we are already familiar. However, it might take the form of some additional act of piety such as reading a particular passage from Scripture or undertaking some popular devotion such as saying the rosary (or some part of it) or making the Stations of the Cross.* Our penances are, in a real sense, only tokens of our sorrow, of our love of God, and of our renewed resolution never to offend Him again.

* Sacramental penances are not designed to correspond directly to the gravity of our sins for that would be an example of the heresy of Pelagianism which claims that we can merit salvation through our own efforts unaided by grace, which of course we cannot.
