PLEASE HELP!

Our regular income as a parish is lower than our regular outgoings!

Stephen Griggs, Chair of our Parish Council, will speak at all Masses this weekend.

It costs us £275 each day to maintain this church and to keep it open and in good working order. Roofs, gutters, windows, fire escapes, new boilers, heating, lighting, damp-proofing, security systems, administrative costs, general maintenance and repairs, along with ordinary running costs such as everything needed for Mass and the administration of the Sacraments (bread, wine, candles, printing newsletters, petrol so Fr Joseph can visit the sick and housebound, and so on) all add up.

The cost of living crisis has hit your household. I'm afraid it has hit our parish costs too.

Just like your household budget, we need to make sure that our parish income is higher than our out-goings. As Mr Micawber says in Charles Dickens' novel, *David Copperfield*, 'Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen and six, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty-pound nought and six, result misery.'

Please think about how much you give to the parish weekly or monthly, and ask whether your giving is realistic. Our parish is flourishing spiritually. If everyone gave a bit more, it could flourish financially too.

If you are a UK tax-payer, please **Gift Aid** your donations (and complete a Gift Aid form from the back of church if you have not already done so).

Please take out a **standing order** with your bank instead of giving in cash. This way, our income will be regular rather than fluctuating.

And please **review your existing standing order** and increase the amount if you have not done so recently.

SOUL CAKES

Blessing of Soul Cakes following the 12:15pm Mass on Thursday, 31st October.

Bake & bring your own Soul Cakes to be blessed ahead of All Saints & Holy Souls.

Our modern day Hallowe'en custom of *trick-or-treating* is a corruption of a mediæval tradition of praying for the dead. Children would go round all the homes in the village, promise to pray for the souls of those who had died in that household, and were rewarded with a Soul Cake.

Here at St Pancras we shall bless Soul Cakes on All Hallows Eve as part of a re-sanctifying of what has become a very pagan celebration. There are several recipes for Soul Cakes online. Here's just one. Get baking!

300g plain flour
A pinch of nutmeg
150g caster sugar
2 tsp ground mixed spice
150g butter, diced
75g currants
1 tbsp oats

½ tbsp cider vinegar

2 egg yolks (or 1 whole egg, beaten)

- (i) Preheat the oven to 180C, fan 160C, gas 4. Sift the flour, spices and a pinch of salt into a mixing bowl, then add the butter and rub in with your fingers. Stir in the oats, currants and sugar.
- (ii) Whisk the egg, milk and cider vinegar together until just combined, then stir into the dry ingredients. Bring together into a soft dough, and add more milk if the dough is too dry.
- (iii) On a floured surface, roll out to about 5mm thick. Stamp out the soul cakes with a 6cm to 7cm round cutter, and score a cross lightly on the top. Transfer to two greased baking trays.
- (iv) Bake for 15-25 minutes until pale golden brown. Cool on a wire rack. Makes 30.

Fr Joseph writes: This week we continue our look at the Sacrament of Confession.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 36: PENANCE – INDULGENCES AND THE TREASURY OF MERIT

Indulgences are often misunderstood, are the subject of controversy between Catholics and non-Catholics, and are even thought by many Catholics today to be a thing of the past. In fact, the doctrine of indulgences is a tremendously rich gift from God which, when we break it down to its simplest component parts, is as easy to understand as the concept of one Christian praying for another, for that, in essence, is what the doctrine of indulgences comes down to.

First, it is useful to recall that with God there is no past or future, only an eternal present. In other words, there is no sell-by date on prayer. We can pray for someone's well-being in the future, and we can pray for someone who died a long time ago. In either case, God receives our prayers and, according to His will, applies whatever merit they may contain irrespective of any human timescale. For example, the prayers and sacrifices of the first century martyrs may be received by God at the time they were offered and applied by Him to whoever or whatever situation He chooses, even if that application is made, in terms of human history, many centuries later. So, although there is no physical reservoir of prayers waiting to be used (like water in a lake), this image is, nonetheless, what the Church means when She refers to the Treasury of Merit. In this way, the spiritual bond of what we call the Communion of Saints enables each of us to benefit from the prayers, penances, and good works of others.*

The merits of Christ's sufferings on Calvary may be applied to those who come after Him as well as to those who lived on earth before Him (and not just to those who stood at the foot of the Cross with Our Lady and St John). As a result, any sufferings we offer up to God, any tribulations we unite to the sufferings of Christ as part of our completing in our flesh what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ (Col 1:24), can form part of the great outpouring of blessings and graces that flow from the pierced side of Our Lord on the Cross (Jn 19:34). In other words, any prayers, penances, or good works we offer to God can contribute to the work of redemption, just as the efforts of Simon of Cyrene did (Mk 15:21 et par).

Indulgences draw on this treasury of merit and tap into this flow of graces and blessings, enabling us to contribute to the work of our own salvation as well as to the salvation of others. By 'others' is especially meant those souls in Purgatory who are now unable, through acts of the will, to contribute further to their own salvation because death is, as it were, the cut-off point beyond which we can no longer affect the growth, or otherwise, of our capacity for God's love.

Which leads us nicely onto the topic of Purgatory.

* By good works, the Church means receiving the Sacraments with a proper disposition of the heart and mind as well as charitable or penitential works which spring from a supernatural source and motive and have God as their end, including, for example, abstinence and fasting.
