The Season of Advent

Don't let Advent get swallowed up by Yuletide!

Christmas is, for most people, exciting, colourful, and fun. It is filled with seasonal sights and sounds, foodstuffs and music, traditions and customs. We all have our own ways of celebrating Christmas, and each household develops its own rituals and observances.

But what happens 'out there' in the world, and what happens in Catholic homes and churches, are two very different things. And whilst we have all allowed secular celebrations to influence how we keep



Christmas, nonetheless it is still worth drawing a distinction between the festival of Yuletide in which most of the world revels and the immemorial and supernatural celebrations which Catholics observe in their churches and in their homes.

Perhaps the biggest difference is the way in which the world *anticipates* Christmas but does not *celebrate* it. All the music and the tinsel and the razzmatazz gets the heart beating in anticipation. It's exciting and we can't wait!

But as soon as Christmas itself begins, the world has finished with it. By Boxing Day, Christmas is, for many people, over and done with, and the glitter is brushed off and the songs shut down until next year.



By contrast, Advent is, for Catholics, a time not of anticipation but of preparation: not of arranging material provisions but of purging our souls of sin and observing acts of penitence and spiritual

preparation for the coming of our Saviour into our hearts once more.

For the world, Christmas begins no later than 1st December and ends on 26th. By contrast the feast of Christmas actually begins on 25th December and runs till 6th January, the feast of the Epiphany.

And because Christmas is about the beginnings of Christ's work of redemption, with the coming into the world of the Son of God who will save us from our sins, so Advent is given to us to help us focus our attention on prayerful preparation, abstinence, and fasting. Hence the colour purple. Devout Catholics would, I suppose, no more think of eating mince pies in Advent than they would of eating Easter eggs during Lent! Don't confuse the two: Advent is Advent and Christmas is Christmas.

Advent Rosary each Wednesday in Advent at 6:30pm straight after the 6pm Mass. Meditations on the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary, with hymns, and concluding with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Blessing of Oranges on the feast of St Nicholas at the end of Mass on Friday, 6^{th} December.



First Friday Confessions, 6th December 6pm—7pm.

The feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (usually on 8th December) is transferred this year to Monday 9th. Come to Mass (with hymns) in honour of she who is, 'the glory of Jerusalem, the joy of Israel, and the highest honour of our race' (Judith 13:23).



St Lucy's Blessing (of Eyes and Prayer for the Gift of Sight) at the end of Mass on the feast of St Lucy, Friday 13th December.

A Rorate Mass at 7am on Saturday 14th December. The Rorate Mass is the traditional Advent Mass in honour of Our Blessed Lady, said before dawn, and lit only by candles!

Fr Joseph writes: We continue our look at the Sacrament of Holy Order and the ordination of priests.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 42 Holy Order – Instituted by Christ

The purpose of the sacramental priesthood is to ensure that the graces won (or merited) by Christ on the Cross on Calvary two thousand years ago may be applied to individual souls across the globe and down the ages. In other words, in the Sacrament of Holy Order, those ordained to the sacred ministry receive the sacramental power and grace required to perform their sacred duties of continuing the work begun by Christ.

The priesthood was instituted by Christ in stages, or, at least, certain of its sacramental powers were conferred on the first priests – the Apostles – in stages.

At the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday Our Lord conferred upon His Apostles the power to confect the Sacrament of the Most Holy Eucharist, that is, He gave them the sacramental power to offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and to change the bread and wine into His Most Sacred Body and Precious Blood through the miracle of *transubstantiation*: 'Do this for a commemoration of me' (Lk 22:19). Likewise, Our Lord conferred upon them the power to forgive sins in the Sacrament of Confession when, in the evening of the day of His Resurrection when He appeared to them in the Upper Room, He breathed on them, saying 'Receive ye the Holy Ghost. Whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them; and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained' (Jn 20:22-23).

Not only are the ordinands (those to be ordained) empowered to confect the sacraments, they are also commissioned to do so. That is, they are sent forth – in the sense of 'commanded' – to administer the sacraments: 'As the Father has sent me, I also send you,' Our Lord tells the Apostles (Jn 20:21).

Our Lord reaffirms this commission shortly before His ascension back into heaven forty days after His resurrection: 'All power is given to me in heaven and in earth. Going therefore, teach ye all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you' (Mt 28:18-19). Here, in commanding them to observe all things whatsoever He have commanded them, Our Lord confers upon His Apostles the authority to teach and to govern as well as to sanctify.

Moreover, in His promise, 'Behold I am with you all days, even to the consummation of the world' (Mt 28:20), Christ perpetuates in His Church, through the Sacrament of Holy Order, the same powers and authority that He bestowed upon His Apostles, reassuring the members of His Church, as St Paul writes later, that they would never be without access to the fulfilment of all their spiritual needs, 'having all sufficiency in all things' (Phil 4:19; 2 Cor 9:8). St Paul adds, in his Letter to Titus whom he ordained Bishop of Crete, that it was 'for this cause I left you in Crete, that you should set in order the things that are wanting, and should ordain priests in every city, as I also appointed you' (Tit 1:5).
