### MONTH OF THE HOLY SOULS

### WHAT IS AN INDULGENCE?

All sins are punished, whether in this life or in the next. If we have suffered more in this life than we have sinned – and have offered that suffering up to God as penances – then we will not have to suffer in the next life (in Purgatory). However, if, when we die, there is still some punishment outstanding then we will have to pay that debt in Purgatory and suffer accordingly.

An indulgence is the remission in full (a plenary indulgence) or in part (a partial indulgence) of the temporal punishment due to our sins. ('Temporal' means *not* the eternal punishment of hell.)

Indulgences can be obtained for ourselves or for those who have already died and are in Purgatory (but not for other people who are still living). The Holy Souls in Purgatory cannot gain indulgences for themselves because they have had their time on earth in which to live a life of virtue and undertake their penances voluntarily. So, once souls arrive in Purgatory they rely on us to pray for them.

November Dead List envelopes are now available at the back of church. Please write down on a piece of paper the names of all your loved ones for whom you wish to pray. Pop a Mass offering into the envelope as well. November Dead List Masses will be said each week throughout November, and Masses for the Holy Souls will be said throughout the coming twelve months too.

Fr Joseph writes:

This week we start our consideration of the next Sacrament, Extreme Unction or Sacrament of the Sick.

### THE SACRAMENTS PT 38:

### EXTREME UNCTION – INSTITUTED BY CHRIST

'Is any man sick among you? Let him bring in the priests of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith shall save the sick man: and the Lord shall raise him up: and if he be in sins, they shall be forgiven him,' (James 5:14-15). This very clear injunction from St James is the main scriptural basis for the sacramental anointing of sick people in the Catholic Church. The Sacrament of Extreme Unction (from the Latin unctionem meaning 'anointing') – sometimes called the Sacrament of the Sick – is linked to the Sacrament of Penance insofar as it, too, is a sacrament of forgiveness and healing. Indeed, it is regarded by the Fathers of the Church as the completion of the Sacrament of Penance. Even so, the sick person should, if it is physically possible, make his or her Confession before this Sacrament is administered. This Sacrament is called Extreme Unction not because it is given so close to death but because it is the last anointing of the Christian, after having been anointed in Baptism, in Confirmation, and, if he be a priest, at his ordination.

The words from St James show us the Divine institution of the Sacrament, especially when we look at it in parallel to Our Lord's healing and forgiving of the paralytic man who was lowered through the roof of a house: 'And when Jesus had seen their faith, He says to the sick of the palsy: Son, thy sins are forgiven thee.' And when the scribes heard this, they objected that only God could forgive sins. So Our Lord replied to them, 'Which is easier, to say to the sick of the palsy: Thy sins are forgiven thee; or to say, Arise, take up thy bed, and walk?' (Mk 2:1-12 *et par*). In other words, Our Lord instituted a sacrament which would provide both spiritual and physical solace.

The penitential character of this Sacrament means that it may only be administered to someone who has already attained the age of reason. If an infant, having been baptized, was on the point of death then, not having reached the age of reason and not, therefore, having committed any actual sins, this Sacrament would not be needed, in the same way that a child who had not reached the age of reason would not go to the Sacrament of Confession.

This sacrament may be received more than once if, for example, a sick person recovers his health but then suffers a relapse of his sickness, or if, having once received the Sacrament, he suffers a significant deterioration in his health due to the progression of the same sickness.

Any priest may administer this Sacrament. Indeed, in an emergency, even a priest who has been laicized can validly administer this Sacrament, so important is it that a Catholic is fortified by the rites of the Church on his deathbed. A deacon cannot administer Extreme Unction.

Call a Priest in an emergency! If someone is dying, do not wait but call a priest to administer the Last Rites. If Fr Joseph is not immediately available, call one of the other priests in a nearby parish.
