WHAT ARE EMBER DAYS?

From a corruption of the words Quatuor Tempora (four times or four seasons), Ember Days are traditional days of fasting and abstinence in supplication for God's blessings, and in thanksgiving for blessings received. Although no longer popularly observed, the Roman Missal still makes provision for their observance, and some people like to incorporate them into their private devotions. They fall on Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday this week, and provide us with an excellent opportunity to observe Advent as a penitential season before the festivities of Christmas get underway in earnest on Christmas Day.

Holy Year 2025



Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, will open the doors of St Peter's Basilica (pictured) on Christmas Eve and thereby inaugurate the Holy Year 2025. Held every 50 years to begin with (since 1300), and then every 25 years, the Holy Year of Jubilee marks a time of especial devotion, pilgrimage, and penance, as well as rejoicing and thanksgiving. It is a year in which God's grace is poured even more abundantly upon His Church throughout the world.

In particular, there will be—as there has been since the year 1300—a Holy Year Indulgence which may be gained by fulfilling certain conditions. Details of these conditions will be laid out in our forthcoming Holy Year Handbook which will explain what these conditions are, what an indulgence is, and how you may gain the indulgence. Copies of the handbook will be free but we shall



ask for donations to cover the costs please.

The Feast of the Holy Family and the Beginning of our Holy Year Posada

One of the ways in which we will mark the Holy Year in St Pancras is to keep a *posada*. A statue of the Holy Family will be blessed on the feast of the Holy Family (the Sunday after Christmas Day). Once it is blessed, Catholic households (be they made up of families, young, middle-aged, or elderly couples, or individuals) will be invited to take the statue home and pray, each day, the accompanying prayer, and return the statue after one



week. Then the next household will take the statue home for a week. The idea is for the statue to travel around the households of the parish as we pray for the sanctification of our homes throughout the parish throughout the Holy Year.

Please sign the Holy Year Posada List at the back of the church if you would like to play host to the statue.

EPIPHANY

The feast of the Epiphany on 6th January marks the end of the season of Christmastide and the beginning of Epiphanytide. The word 'Epiphany' comes from a Greek word meaning 'to reveal' and marks God's revelation to the whole world (represented by the Wise Men from the east) of the Nativity of Christ which, so far, had only been made known to a few shepherds.

We shall bless chalk for the traditional Epiphany house blessing at our Epiphany Benediction. But in the meantime, please put the date of the Epiphany Benediction in your diary!

Saturday, 4th January at 3pm

The Epiphany Gospel and procession, concluding with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

All are welcome, especially young families.

Bring & share refreshments in the hall afterwards (and we hope someone will bring a traditional Galette des Rois, the 'cake of kings'!)

Please note that in 2025, the feast of the Epiphany will be transferred to the nearest Sunday (5th January) although there will be a Traditional Latin Mass at 8am on Monday, 6th January.

Fr Joseph writes: We continue our look at the Sacrament of Holy Order and the ordination of priests.

THE SACRAMENTS PT 44 HOLY ORDER – CHRIST: PRIEST & VICTIM PART I

To understand what a Catholic priest is, and what he does, we must first understand the nature of Christ's sacrifice, and Christ's role as both Priest and Victim.

The mystery at the heart of the Catholic Faith is the act of atonement by which the Incarnate Son of God ransomed, healed, restored, and bestowed forgiveness upon a wayward human race that had alienated itself from its Creator through sin, and rendered that fallen race at-one with God. By laying down His own life through an act of the will (Jn 10:18) Our Lord gave to God the Father, on behalf of a fallen race, the gifts that we as a race and as individuals owed to God but which we had signally failed to give Him. On the Cross, Christ offered up four gifts.

First, He offered a perfect *latreutic* sacrifice, giving to God the perfect act of homage, adoration, and worship. Second, Christ made a perfect eucharistic sacrifice, that is, a perfect act of thanks. Third, Christ made a perfect offering in propitiation and expiation for our sins. (By propitiation we mean that Christ appeared the wrath of God. This does not mean that God was angry with us in the way that we get angry with each other but that the scales of divine justice – of what is owed to God by His creatures – was imbalanced by sin. By propitiating God's anger, Christ was re-setting the scales of divine justice and was giving to the Father what we, as creatures, should have given to the Father but had failed to give Him through our sins of pride and disobedience. By expiation we mean that Christ's gift makes up for - makes amends for – our sinful failure to give to the Father what we should have given to Him.) And fourth, Christ makes supplication on our behalf for all the needs of a fallen race, buying back, as it were, the gifts forfeited by Adam in the Garden of Eden at the Fall.

Christ's offering to the Father was effective because, as Man, he was able to offer up our fallen human nature on our behalf. At the same time, as God, His offering carried an infinite – an eternal – value. As a result, His offering more than made up for our transgressions. But at the heart of His offering lay the fact that He was the Priest who did the offering *and* He was the Victim who was offered.

This willingness to make of Himself the sacrifice that would atone for the sins of an entire race was especially pleasing to God the Father. If love may be defined as giving (to love means to give) then the Only Begotten Son did what only the Incarnate Son of God could do – what no one else could do – namely, He gave Himself to the Father as an eternal offering on behalf of a fallen race to which He had also given Himself at the moment of the Incarnation.
