Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. **Fr Joseph writes:** We continue our short series of brief meditations on the **Four Songs of the Suffering Servant** found in the Book of Isaiah.

The Second Song of the Suffering Servant — Is 49:1-7

Give ear, ye islands, and hearken, ye people from afar. The Lord hath called me from the womb, from the bowels of my mother he hath been mindful of my name. And he hath made my mouth like a sharp sword: in the shadow of his hand he hath protected me, and hath made me as a chosen arrow: in his quiver he hath hidden me. And he said to me: Thou art my servant Israel, for in thee will I glory. And I said: I have laboured in vain, I have spent my strength without cause and in vain: therefore my judgment is with the Lord, and my work with my God. And now saith the Lord, that formed me from the womb to be his servant, that I may bring back Jacob unto him, and Israel will not be gathered together: and I am glorified in the eves of the Lord, and my God is made my strength. And he said: It is a small thing that thou shouldst be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob, and to convert the dregs of Israel. Behold, I have given thee to be the light of the Gentiles, that thou mayst be my salvation even to the farthest part of the earth. Thus saith the Lord the redeemer of Israel, his Holy One, to the soul that is despised, to the nation that is abhorred, to the servant of rulers: Kings shall see, and princes shall rise up, and adore for the Lord's sake, because he is faithful, and for the Holy One of Israel, who hath chosen thee.

The *Second Song* lays out the mission of the Suffering Servant. Having seen in the *First Song* that He will sound a note of warning against complacency and against those who trust in their own judgment, how He will admonish those guilty of pride, self-satisfaction, and self-sufficiency, we now see more clearly to whom the Suffering Servant has been sent: He is to bring back Jacob.

Yet Israel (another name for Jacob and for the whole of God's chosen people) 'will not be gathered together.' Stubborn in their ways, they wander from the right path and set themselves up as judges of their own inheritance. Even so, the Servant knows that He is the true Judge for He has been 'called from the womb' by the Lord God, and is 'glorified in the eyes of the Lord,' as we learn also in the Gospels when, both at His baptism and at His transfiguration, the Father's voice is heard to say, 'This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased.'

In part because Israel will not listen, and in part because He is to be the Redeemer of the whole of mankind, the Servant if sent by God 'to be the light of the Gentiles' (a line we hear repeated in Simeon's song, the *Nunc Dimittis*, at the moment of Our Lord's Presentation in the Temple forty days after His birth: Lk 2:32). To this end He is sent to be the salvation, the Saviour, of all peoples, 'even to the farthest part of the earth.'

The reference to the despised is two-fold. First, it refers to the downtrodden of society who have been trampled upon (see Is 61:1 quoted by Our Lord in the synagogue in Lk 4:18-19). Second, and more significantly in the context of the Song of the Suffering Servant, it refers to the Servant Himself, the Holy One of Israel, who will be despised and rejected by His own people in His Passion and death on the Cross ('He came unto His own, and His own received Him not,' Jn 1:11). Yet following His resurrection 'kings shall see, and princes shall rise up' and see Him 'glorified in the eyes of the Lord.'
