Fr Joseph writes: We continue our short series of brief meditations on the Four Songs of the Suffering Servant found in the Book of Isaiah.

The Third Song of the Suffering Servant — Is 50:4-11

The Lord hath given me a learned tongue, that I should know how to uphold by word him that is weary: he wakens in the morning, in the morning he wakens my ear, that I may hear him as a master. The Lord God hath opened my ear, and I do not resist: I have not gone back. I have given my body to the strikers, and my cheeks to them that plucked them: I have not turned away my face from them that rebuked me, and spit upon me. The Lord God is my helper, therefore am I not confounded: therefore have I set my face as a most hard rock, and I know that I shall not be confounded. He is near that justifies me, who will contend with me? let us stand together, who is my adversary? let him come near to me. Behold the Lord God is my helper: who is he that shall condemn me? Lo, they shall all be destroyed as a garment, the moth shall eat them up. Who is there among you that fears the Lord, that heareth the voice of his servant, that hath walked in darkness, and hath no light? let him hope in the name of the Lord, and lean upon his God. Behold all you that kindle a fire, encompassed with flames, walk in the light of your fire, and in the flames which you have kindled: this is done to you by my hand, you shall sleep in sorrows.

As with so many passages in the Old Testament, we can understand this prophecy best if we imagine the words being spoken by Our Lord. Picture Him during His various trials (before Annas, before Caiaphas, before the members of the Jewish Council, the Sanhedrin, before Pontius Pilate, before Herod, and before Pilate again) and imagine Our Lord speaking these words in those contexts. God the Father has placed me in this situation and 'I do not resist: I have not gone back' on my promise to serve Him. During His trials Our Lord is struck in the face, rebuked, and spat upon. Yet through all His sufferings He knows that God the Father is His helper and therefore He shall not be confounded, and whatever His adversary throws at Him He will be able to stand firm if the Father and He 'stand together.' St Paul echoes these words when he says, 'If God be for us, who is against us?' (Rom 8:31).

During His Passion the Roman soldiers cast lots to see who could win Our Lord's coat (Jn 19:24), but Isaiah's prophecy mocks the soldiers' short-sightedness: what they value are the material things of this world and they gamble for this small treasure when, if they did but know it, they could instead be looking up at the face of the Son of God. That in which they have placed their earthly happiness will turn to dust, eaten by the moths, as Our Lord Himself warned would be the result of any trust placed in worldly goods (Mt 6:20). The irony is lost on the soldiers on Calvary but we see it clearly.

But we now see another irony. Whereas in the *First Song* we are warned against leaning on the bruised reed of pride and self-sufficiency now, in the *Third Song*, we are shown who it is that we *may* reliably lean upon: 'let him hope in the name of the Lord, and lean upon his God.' Christ, in His Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, does exactly this. He fears what is to come and even prays that this chalice of suffering may pass Him by. 'Nevertheless,' He adds, 'not as I will but as thou wilt.'
