LÆTARE SUNDAY

Second collection & a cake sale to raise funds for Mary's Meals

So called because of the opening words of the Introit for today's Mass in Latin, Lætare Ierúsalem: et conventum fácite omnes qui dilígitis eam, 'Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and be glad for her, all you that love her,' Lætare Sunday is more or less halfway through Lent. With the words of rejoicing, the solemnity of the season is lifted slightly, and purple vestments are lightened to a rose colour. Flowers and additional music are allowed today too. We look forward with an ever lighter heart to the glory of Easter.

Rose Sunday was also the day when Popes blessed the Golden Rose, traditionally conferred as a token of affection on churches and shrines, on sovereigns and heads of state. The custom may date back, it is thought, to pre-Charlemagne times, and recent recipients have included the Marian shrines of Guadalupe (2013), Częstochowa (2016), Fatima and Aparecida (2017), and Csíksomlyó (2019).

Today is also Mothering Sunday when, historically, those who were preparing for Baptism at the Easter Vigil would gather together at the Mother Church of the diocese, the Cathedral, for their final stage of preparation. In Victorian times, live-in servants were allowed time off to visit their families, especially their mothers.

Fr Joseph writes: We conclude our short series with the

Fourth Song of the Suffering Servant Is 52: 13-15 and 53:1-12

He shall grow up as a tender plant before him, and as a root out of a thirsty ground: there is no beauty in him, nor comeliness: and we have seen him, and there was no sightliness, that we should be desirous of him: Despised, and the most abject of men, a man of sorrows, and acquainted with infirmity: and his look was as it were hidden and despised, whereupon we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our infirmities and carried our sorrows: and we have thought him as it were a leper, and as one struck by God and afflicted. But he was wounded for our iniquities, he was bruised for our sins: the chastisement of our peace was upon him, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray, every one hath turned aside into his own way: and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was offered because it was his own will, and he opened not his mouth: he shall be led as a sheep to the slaughter, and shall be dumb as a lamb before his shearer, and he shall not open his mouth. He was taken away from distress, and from judgment: who shall declare his generation? because he is cut off out of the land of the living: for the wickedness of my people have I struck him. And he shall give the ungodly for his burial, and the rich for his death: because he hath done no iniquity, neither was there deceit in his mouth. And the Lord was pleased to bruise him in infirmity: if he shall lay down his life for sin, he shall see a long-lived seed, and the will of the Lord shall be prosperous in his hand.

The *Fourth Song* begins near the end of Isaiah ch. 52 and includes all of ch. 53 but we shall look at just a few of the most well known verses (53:2-10 given above).

We see elsewhere in Isaiah that 'there shall come forth a rod out of the root of Jesse, and a flower shall rise up out of his root' (Is 11:1). Now we see that flower as a 'tender plant' that stands 'before him' (that is, before God) yet silent before His accusers, head bowed through physical exhaustion and pain.

At His Incarnation, when the Son of God assumed human nature and came down to earth to dwell among us as Emmanuel, the Word 'being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a servant, being made in the likeness of men' (Phil 2:6-7). In other words, He stripped Himself, as it were, of all the divine splendour which was rightfully His.

Now, in His Passion, it is as if He is being stripped even of His likeness to men, for 'there is no beauty in him, nor comeliness: and we have seen him, and there was no sightliness, that we should be desirous of him: Despised, and the most abject of men, a man of sorrows, and acquainted with infirmity.'

Having come down to earth, the Son of God now scrapes the bottom of the barrel, we might say, and takes upon Himself the very worst sufferings that a fallen race can inflict upon Him. He is become, as it says elsewhere, 'a worm, and no man' (Ps 21:7).

St Peter in his grief at having betrayed his Lord three times writes with humility and passion of this prophecy, and longs that we might see what we sinners—himself included—have done to that 'tender plant.' (1 Pt 2:21-25). St Peter, 'being once converted,' was instructed by the Lamb that was led to the slaughter to 'confirm [his] brethren' in their faith and to feed the Good Shepherd's flock, made up as it is of sheep who go astray (Lk 22:32; Jn 21:15-17).

But in the end—by His resurrection—He who 'hath done no iniquity' shall triumph over the judgment of this world, 'and the will of the Lord shall be prosperous in his hand.'
